# Second-Hand Project-Opportunity or Second-Hand Headache

Many times we, as EAA members, may find a project for sale that someone is abandoning due to age, illness, or other circumstances. This may be a great opportunity to get a project at a much reduced price than it otherwise might be. My feeling is that kits may be a safer bet in being able to complete it without mishap than a plans-built airplane. Here again, however, the workmanship of the project must be taken into account.

We had a problem with the chapter Aircamper project rear its very ugly head today. It didn't help that the Aircamper has been and will continue to be an airplane project by committee. We had a real "guess-what" moment, when it was found that the mounting attach points in the center section were 21 inches apart and the cabane struts to attach to the fuselage were 24 inches. After looking at the plans again today, we found that the fuselage had been widened by the original builder. There had been several ideas tossed around on how to fix the problem, including even having to build a whole new center section, however, with the collaboration of Wayne, Ted, Chuck and Steven there seems to be a plan. Now we just have to make it work.

As the completion rate for plans-built aircraft is significantly lower than many of the more modern kits, there will be more opportunities to get into a building project for lower costs. The more complete the kit, the higher the cost will probably be.

A plans-built project will have the builder learn more skills in the duration of the project. For most plans-built projects you will need to learn wood working skills, metal work, welding, firewall forward, fabric work and even composite work, such as cowlings and fairing. The old time motto of education and recreation surely will apply to plans-built projects. As with most things in experimental aircraft-time equals money. You can save time with spending more money and save money by spending more time.

With a second-hand project, certainly it is a buyer beware situation. Try to do a sane/safe evaluation of the workmanship-pay attention to the little details. Attention to the little things usually translates into attention to the big things as well. If you are interested in a second-hand project, consider taking along another knowledgeable person with you to evaluate the project and he/she might keep you from getting carried away by "a good deal"!
